

- •Education (Scotland) Act 1980: 'adequate and efficient'
- •Standards in Scottish Schools etc Act 2000: presumption of mainstream education
- •Education (Additional Support for Learning) (Scotland) Act 2004 (amended 2009): introduction of concept of Additional Support Needs; strengthened parental rights; introduced dispute resolution framework





ASN Mediation in Scotland

 Education authorities are required by law to have independent mediation services in place, free of charge for parents

 23 local education authorities have contracts with Resolve: ASL and Common Ground Mediation

ASN Mediation in Scotland

676,955 pupils in publicly funded schools


140,524 pupils identified as having additional support needs – about 20.8%

95% pupils with additional support needs learn within mainstream schools

62% pupils with additional support needs are boys, 38% are girls

£4.8bn annual spend on education – £555m of which is allocated to additional support for learning (11%)

Stage 1

- Referral
- Intake meetings with disputants


Stage 2

- Joint mediation meeting/s
- Flexible, based on 5 stage facilitative model


Stage 3

- Conclusion of involvement, closing letters
- Feedback to referrer




